<b>Summary</b>	Old Church Slavonic is the single literary language of the Slavs. ABCs of Old Church Slavonic writing. General characteristics of the phonetic system of Old Church Slavonic in the second half of the 9th century. Changes in the phonetic system of Old Church Slavonic in the late 10th-11th centuries. Characteristics of Proto-Slavic phonetic processes and their results in the Slavic languages. Origin of Slavic vowels. Ancient quantitative and qualitative alternations of vowels. The tendency toward ascending sonority of a syllable in Proto-Slavic and its consequences. Monophthongization of Proto-Slavic diphthongs. The fate of nasal vowels in the Slavic languages. The fate of combinations of vowels with liquids in the middle of a word between consonants in the dialects of the Proto-Slavic language. The tendency toward syllable harmony in Proto-Slavic and its consequences in the phonetic system of Old Church Slavonic. Morphology. Noun. Pronoun. Adjective. Verb.
